

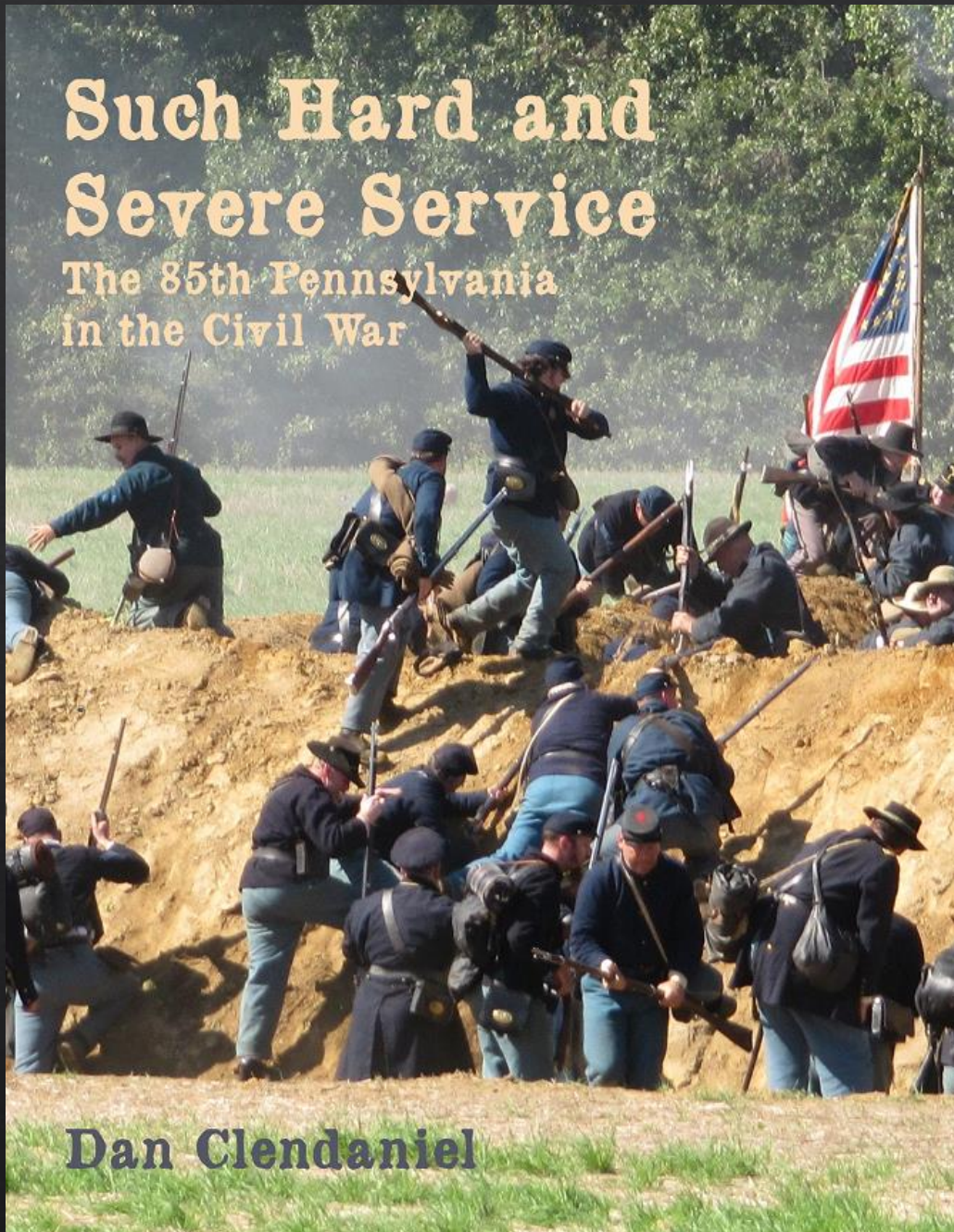

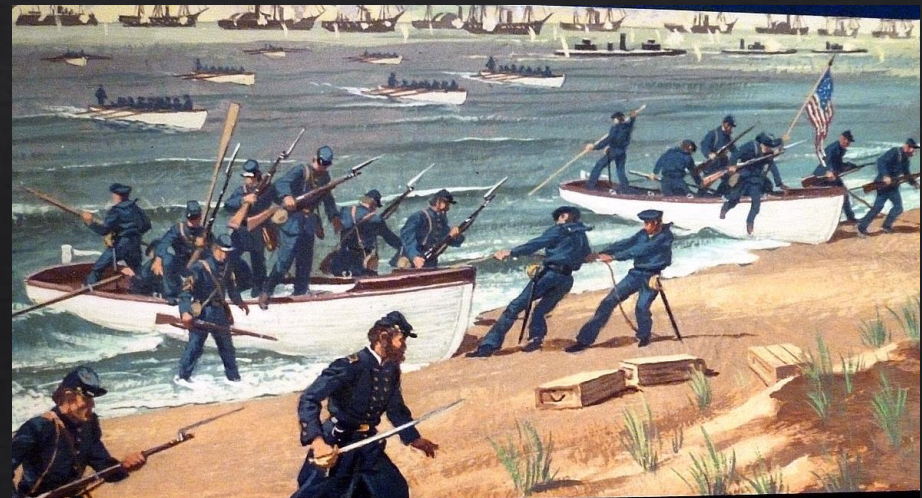

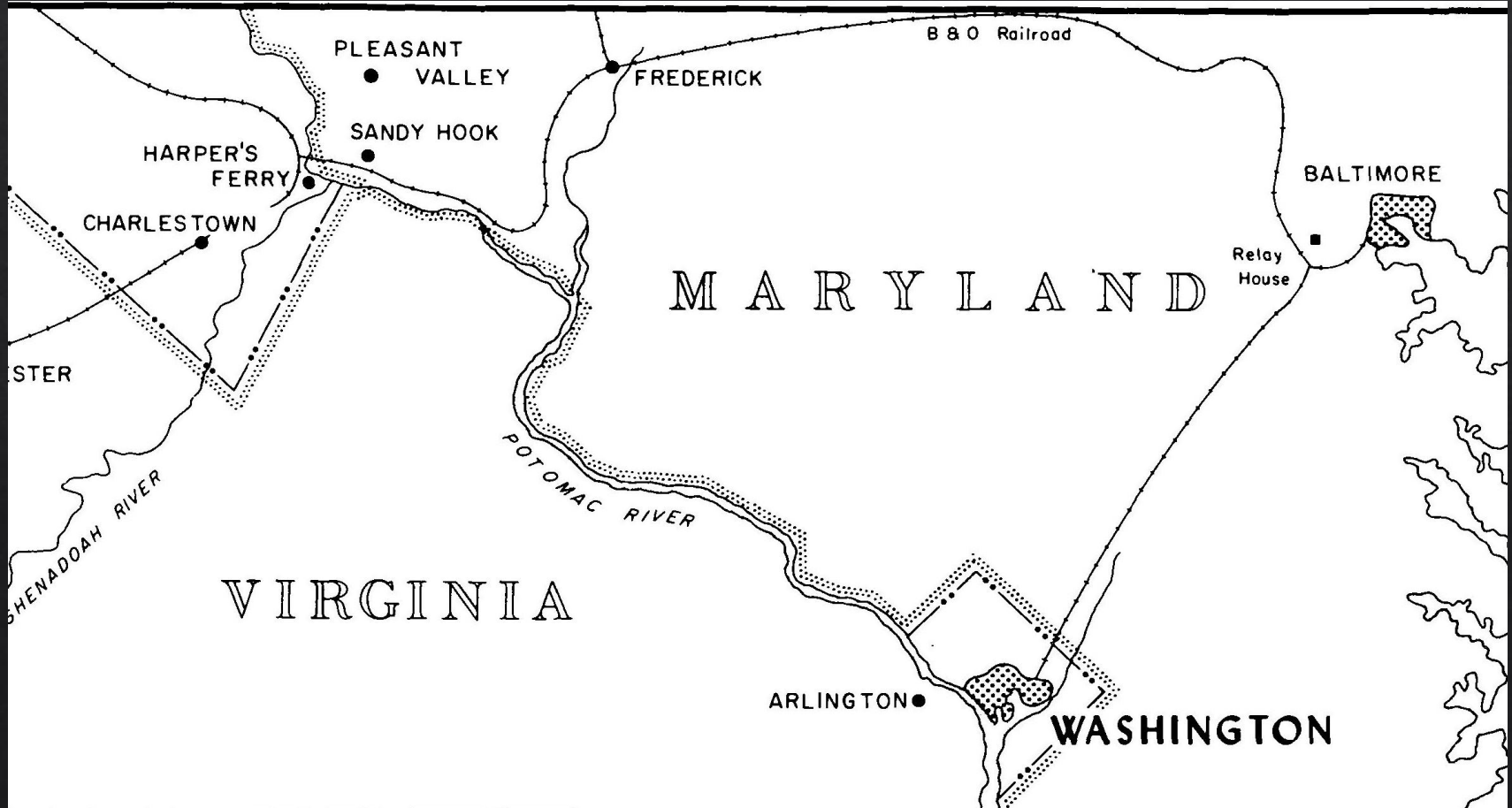
Role of Marines

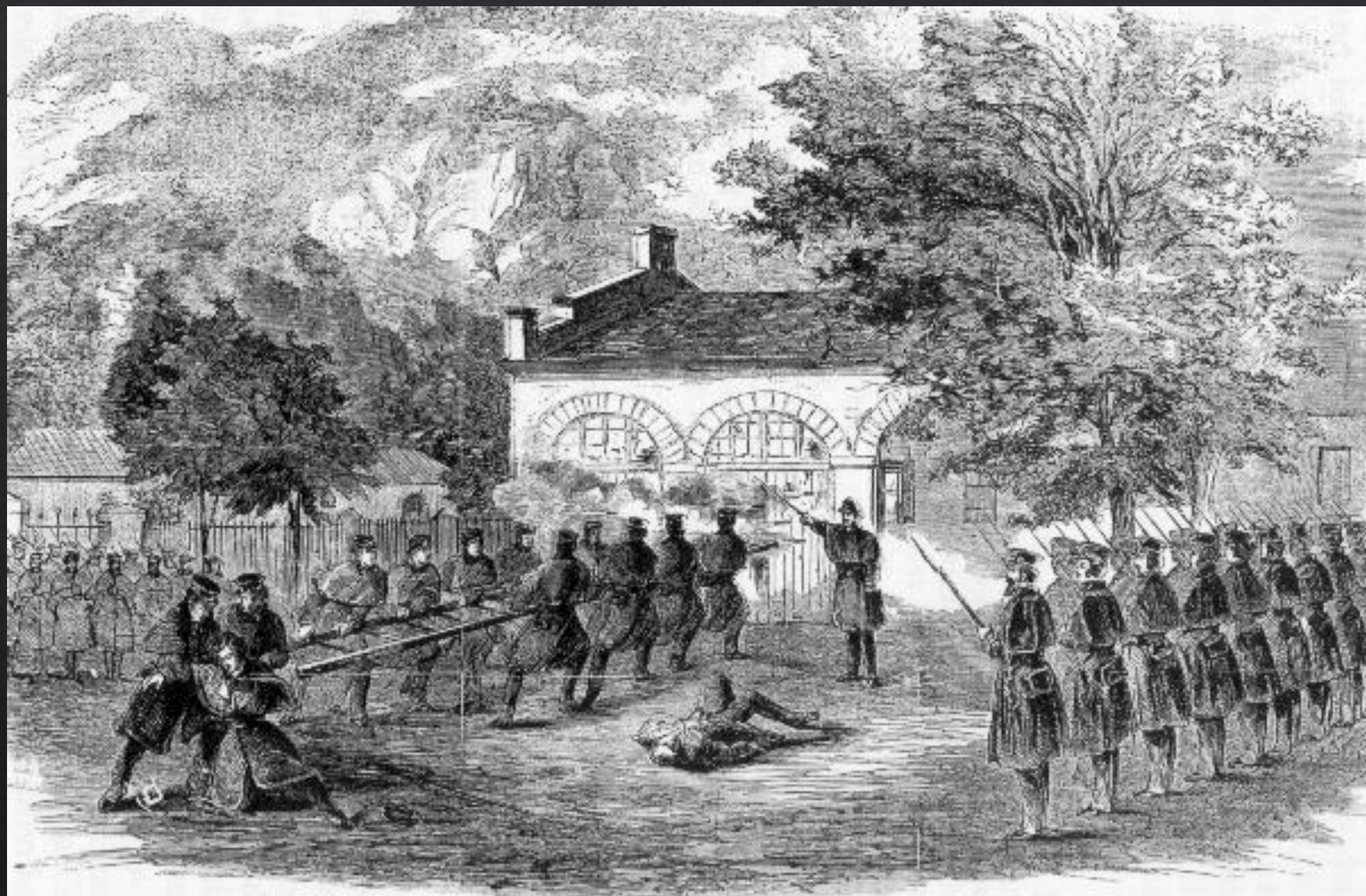

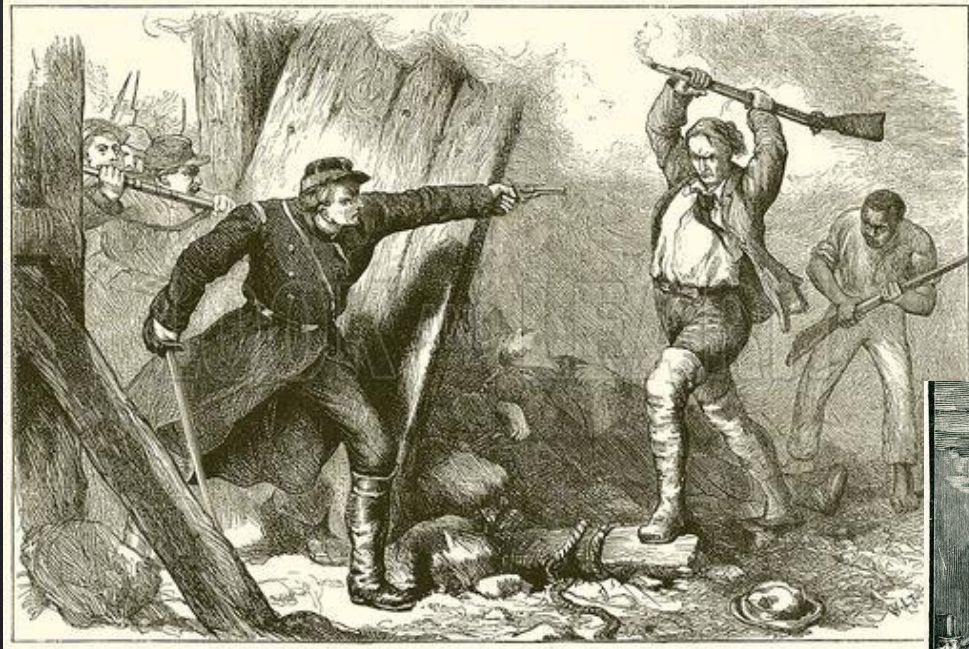

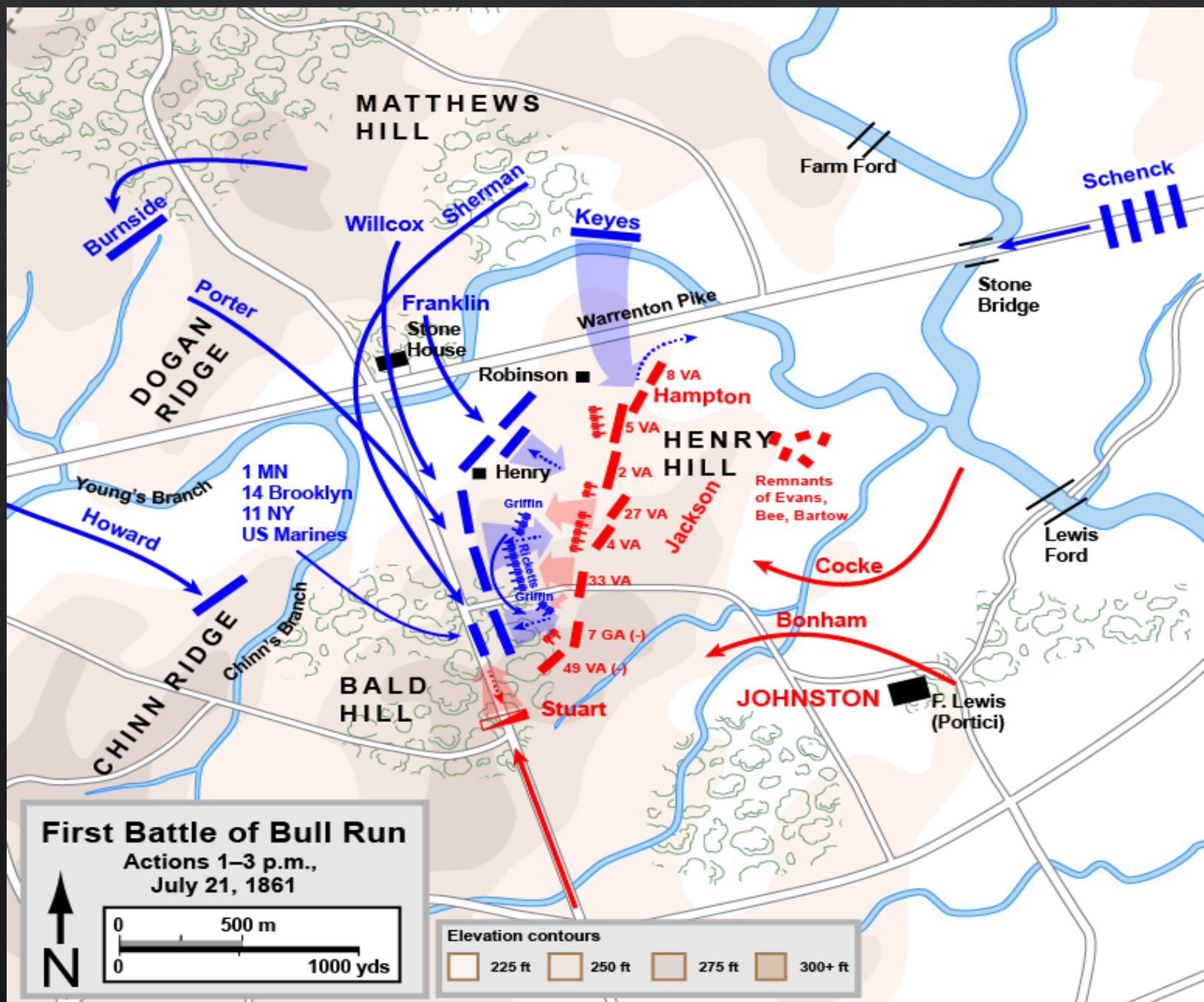

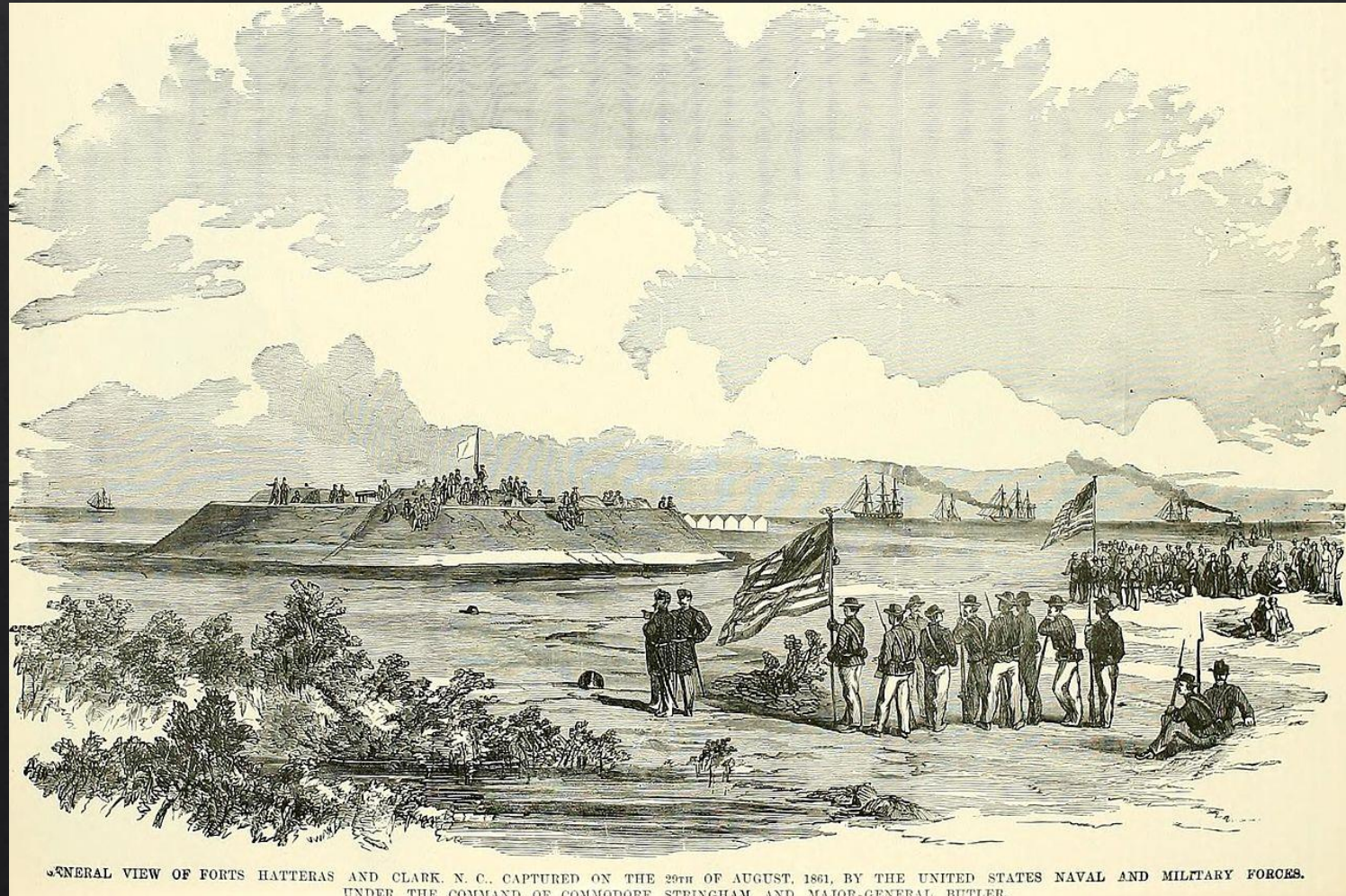

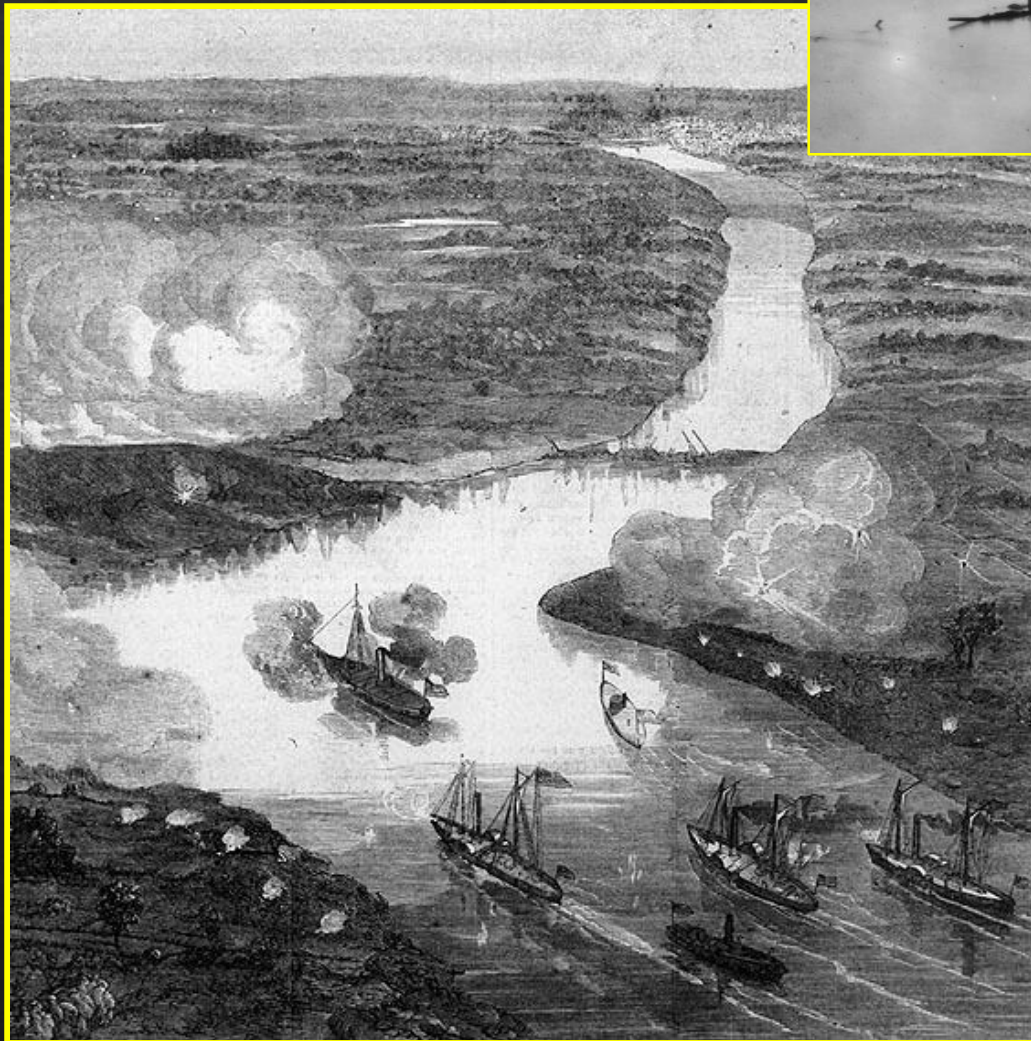

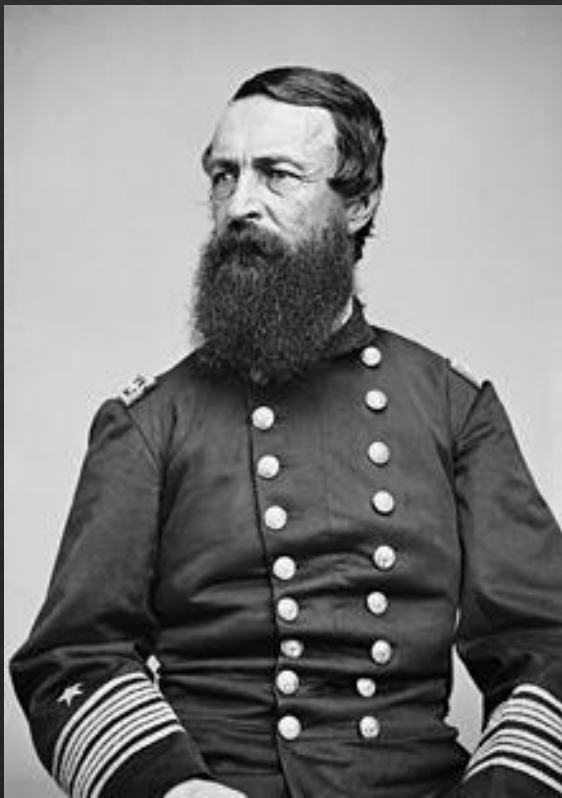

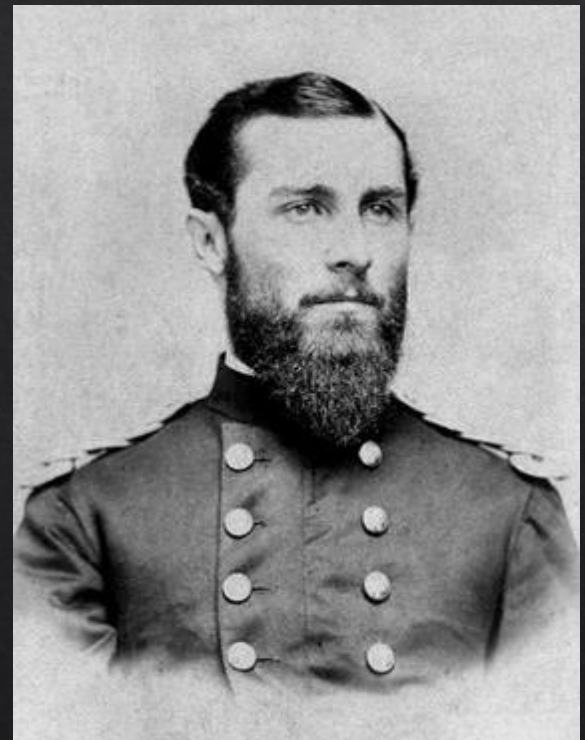

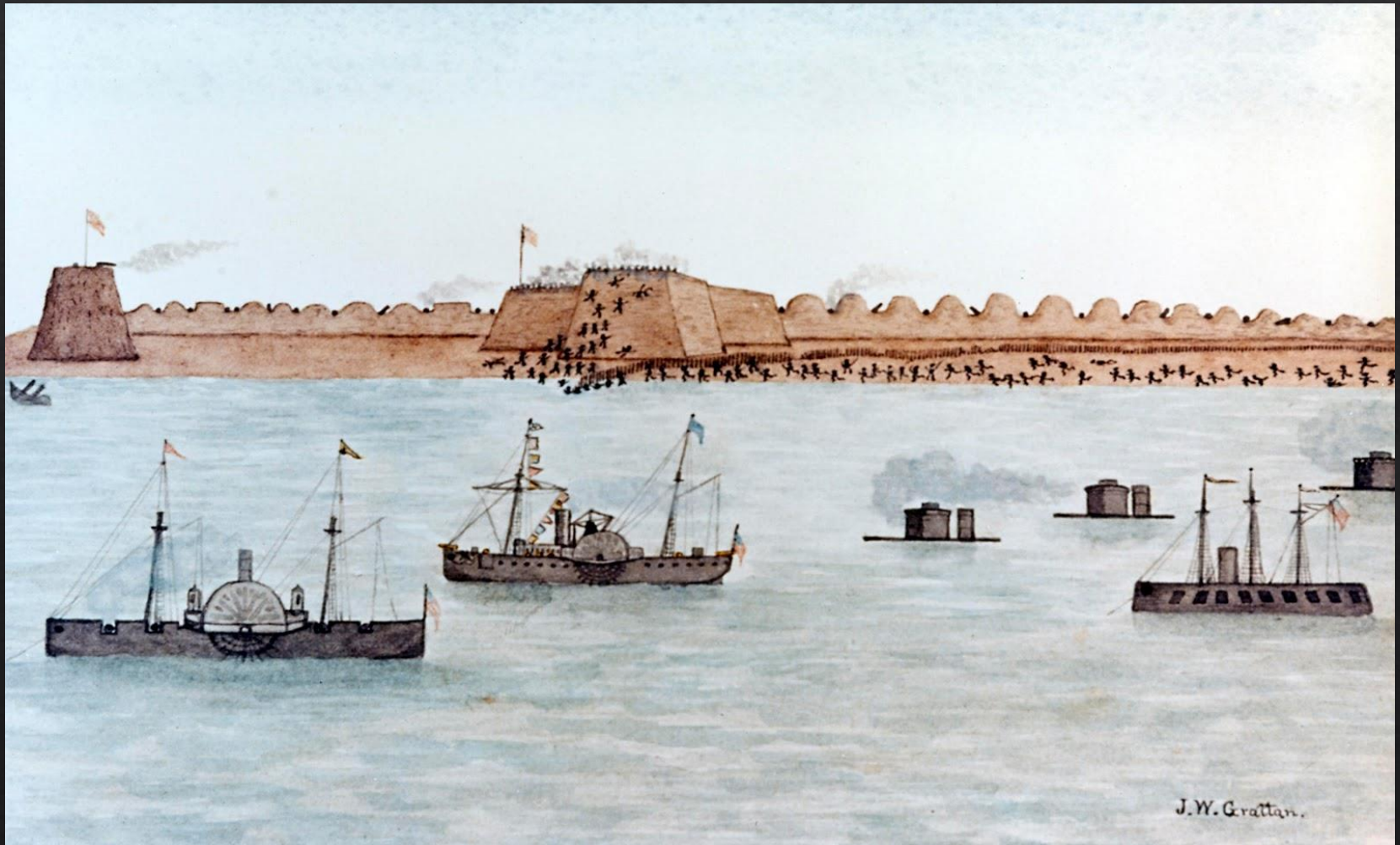
