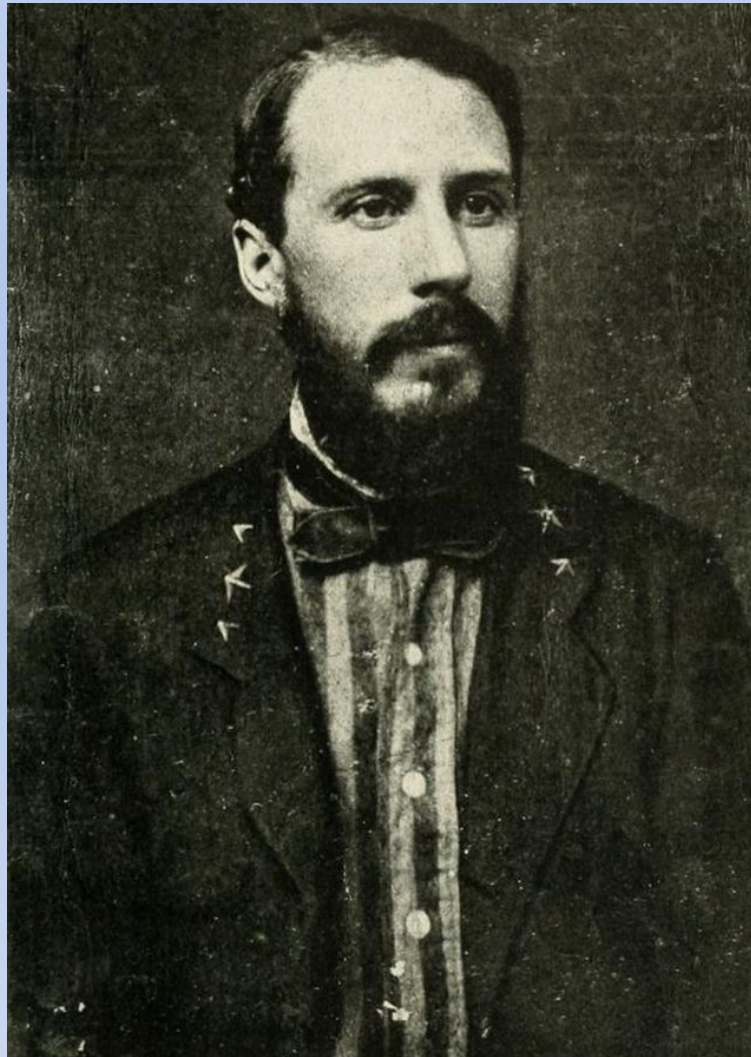


Burnside's Battle Plan



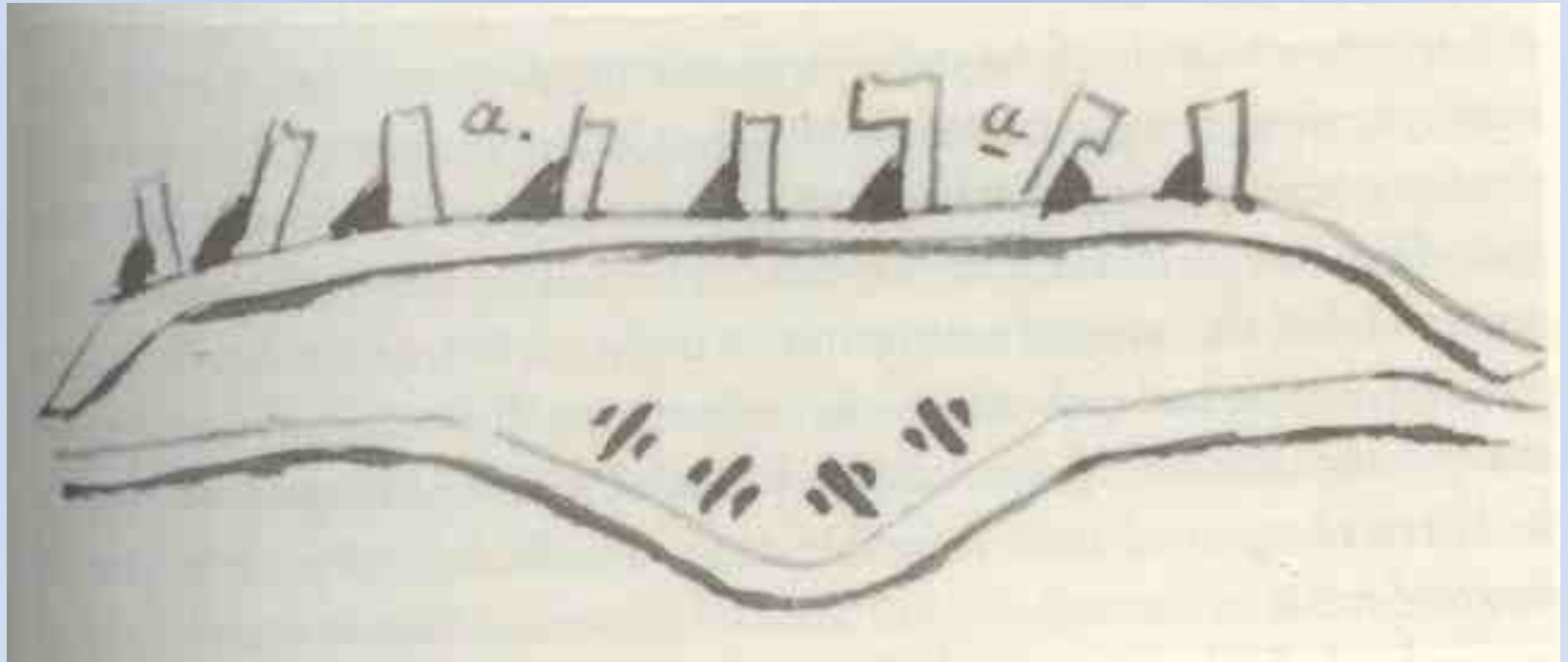

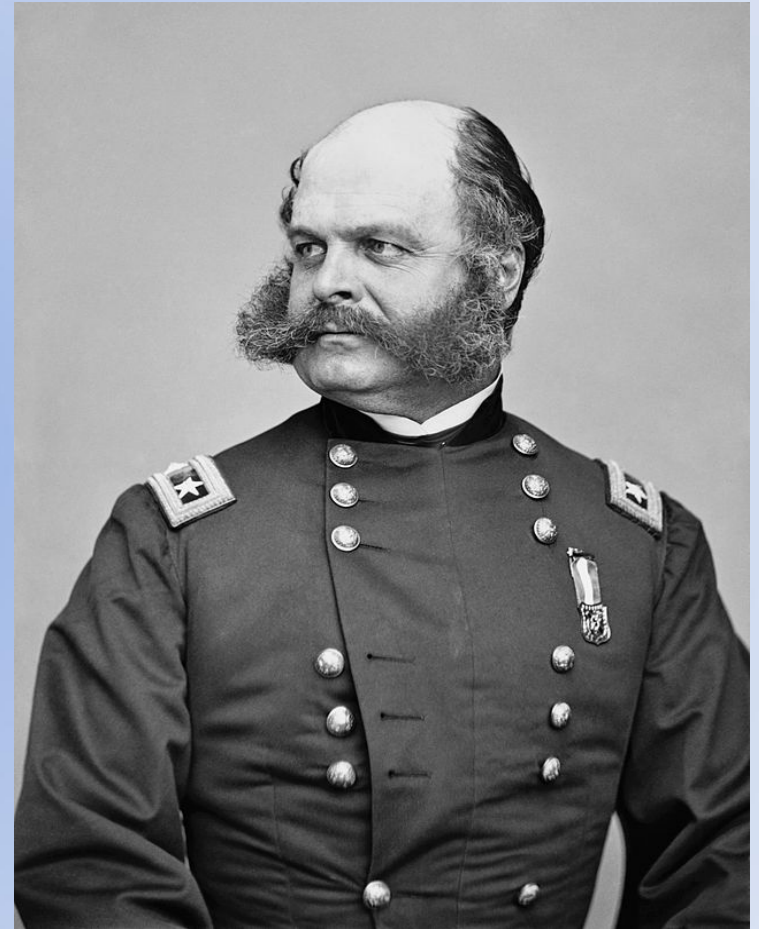

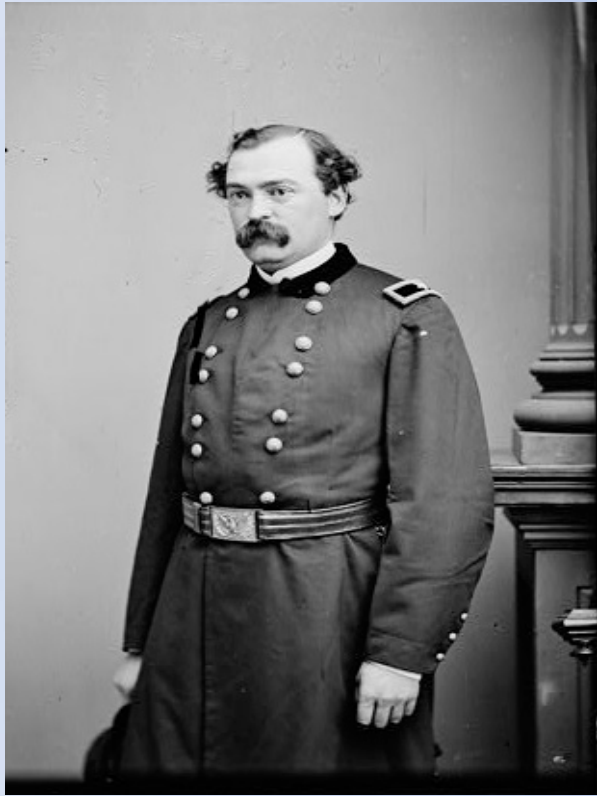

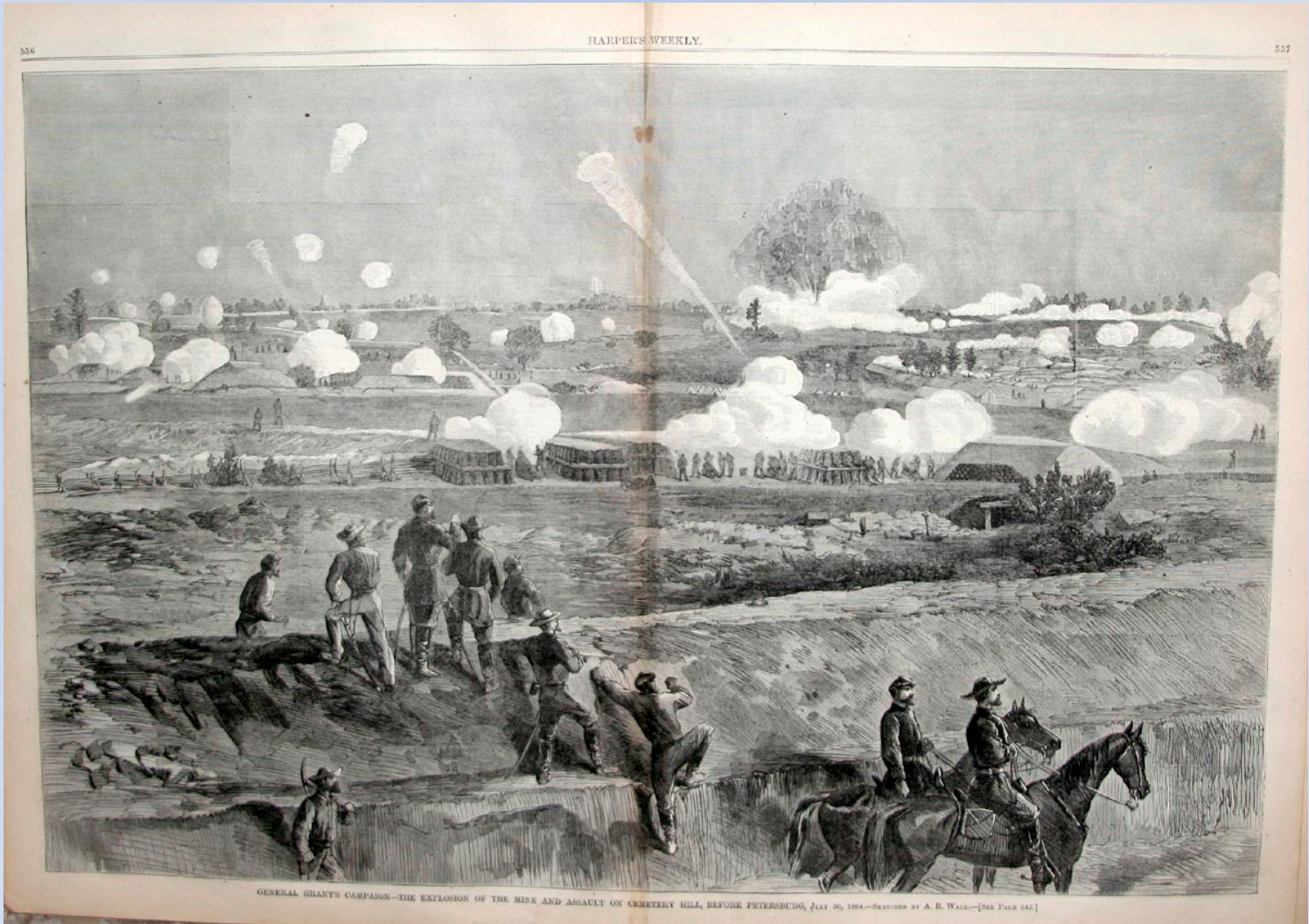

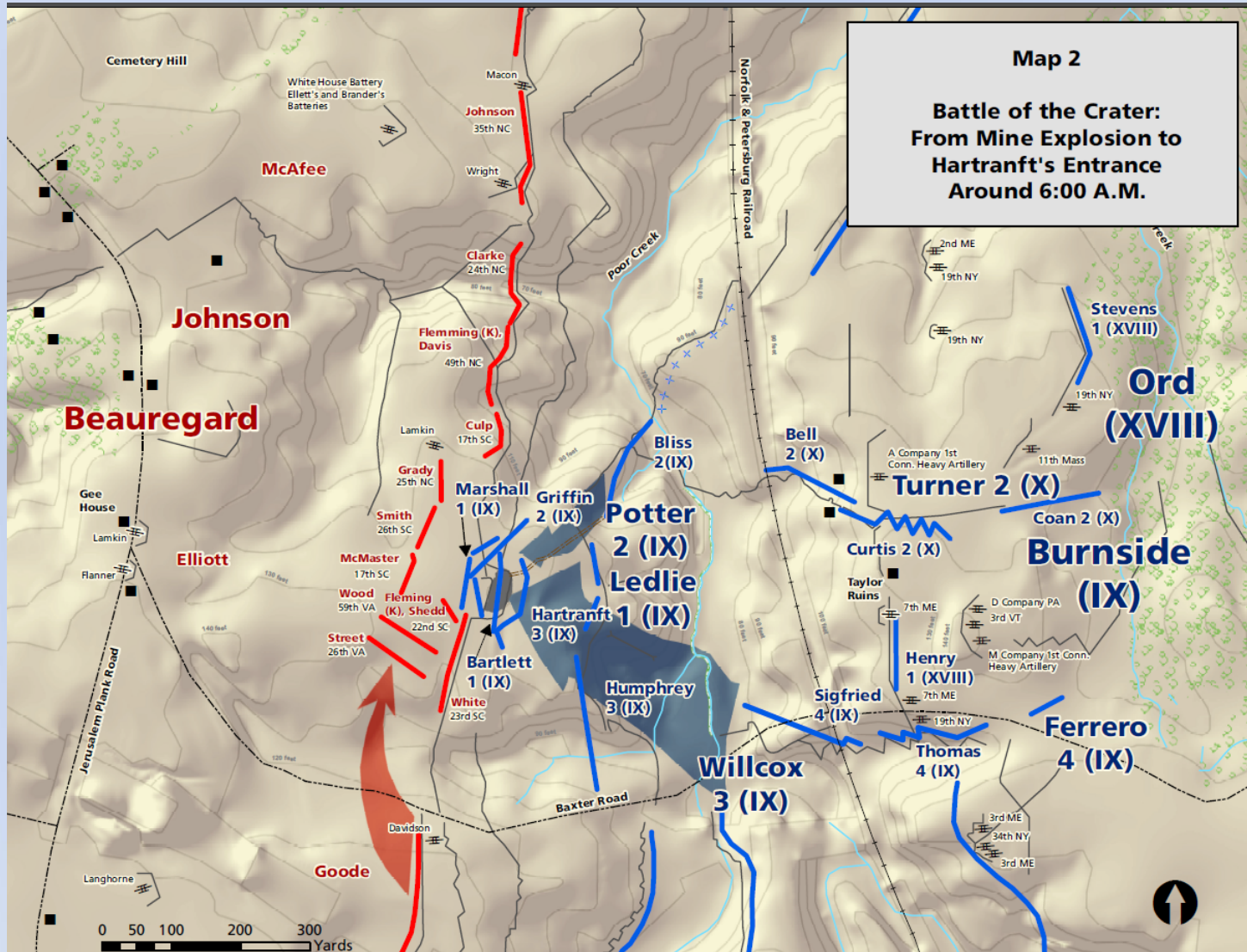

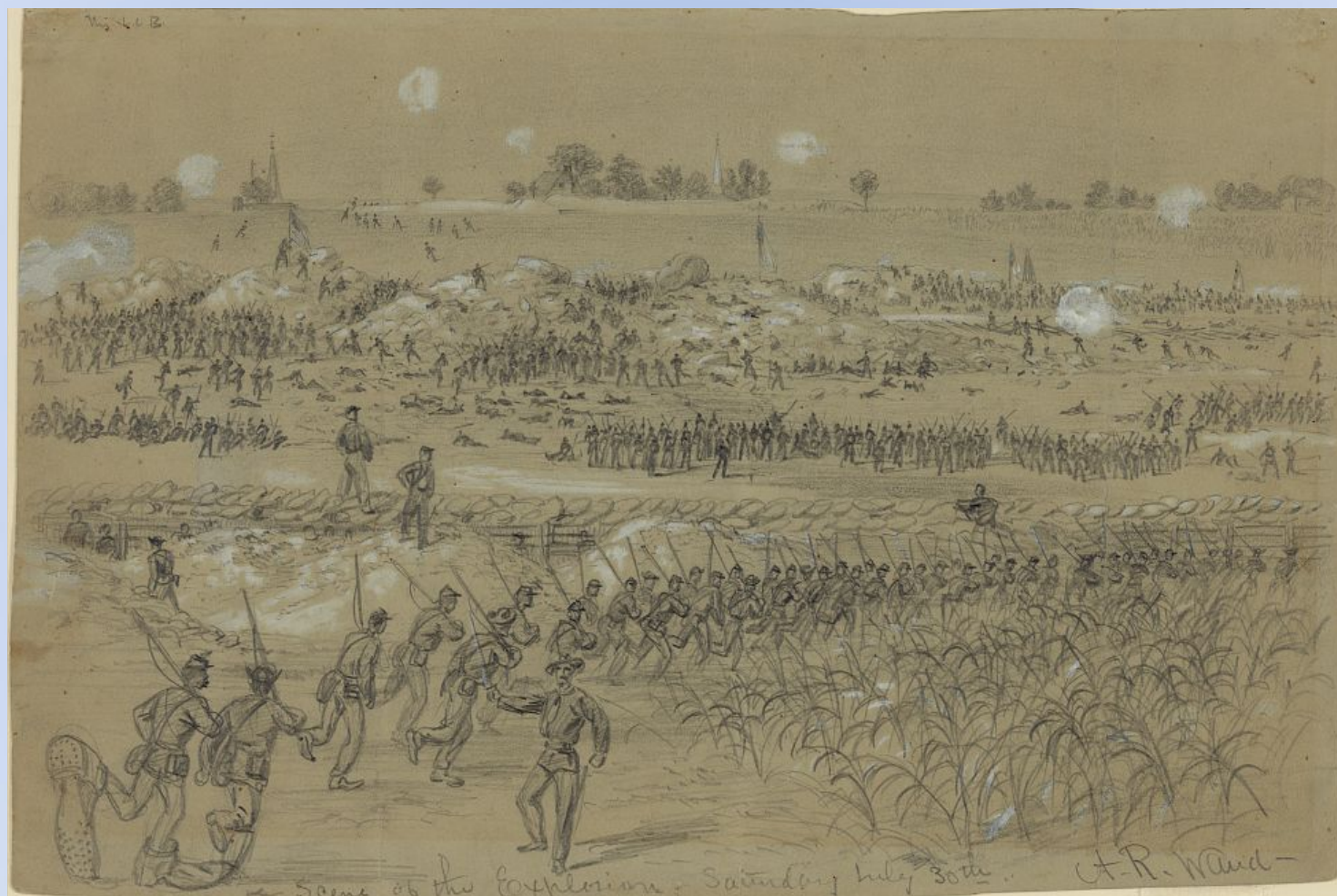

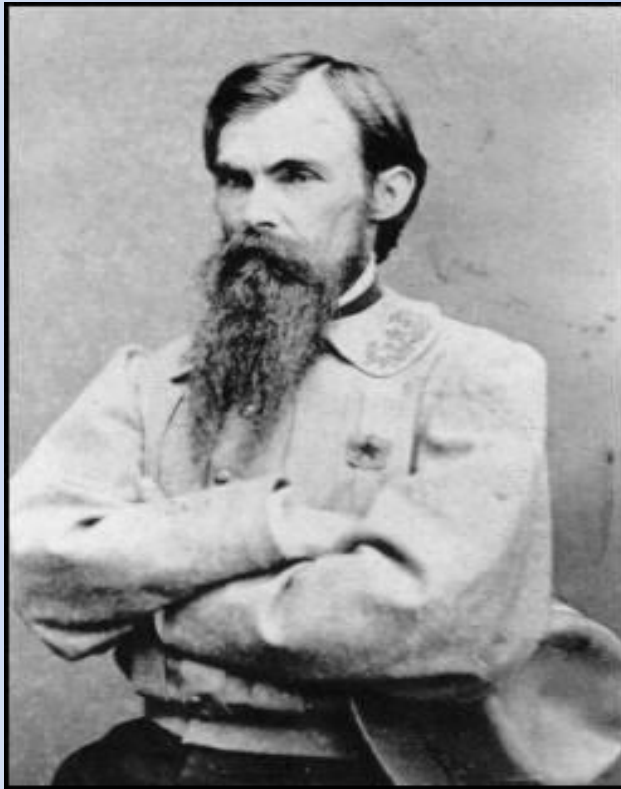

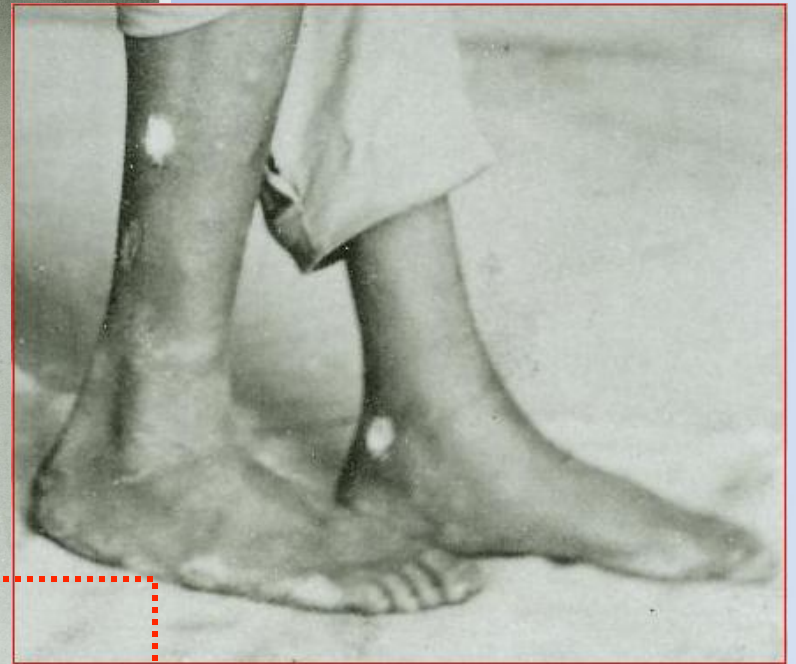
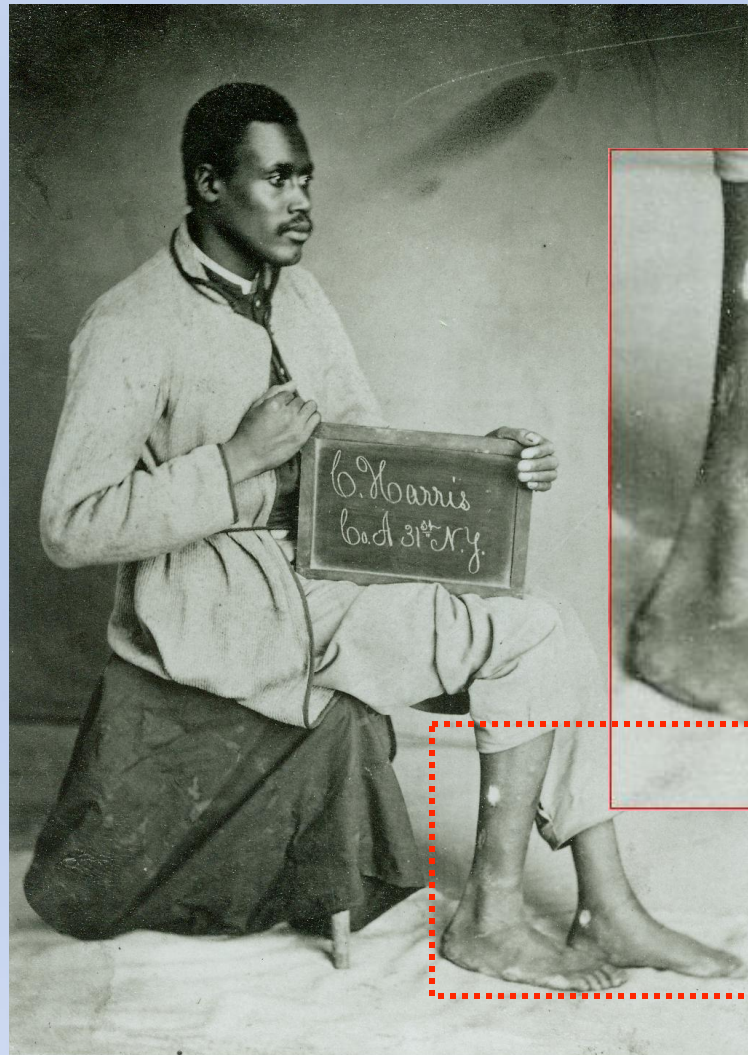

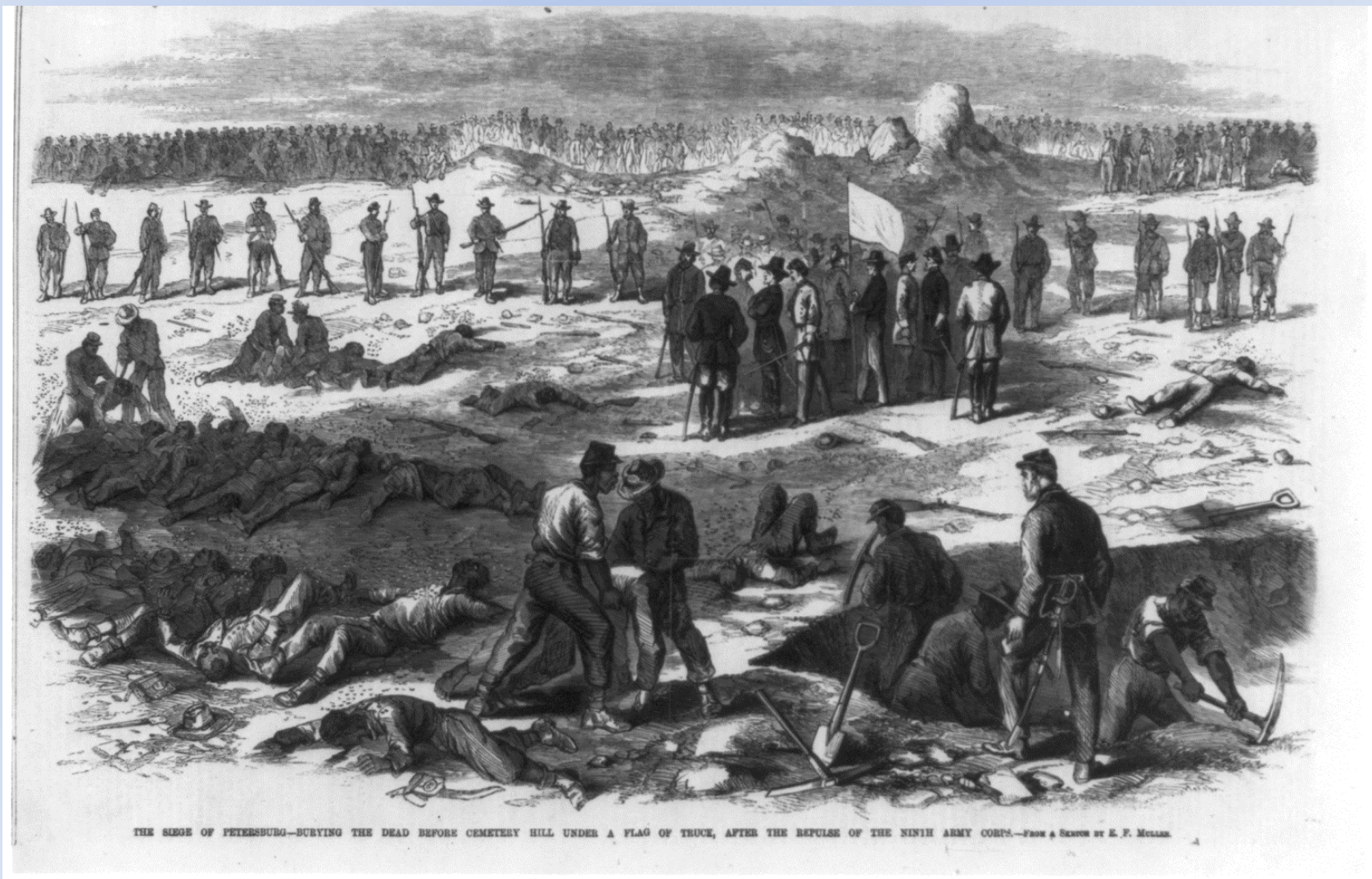

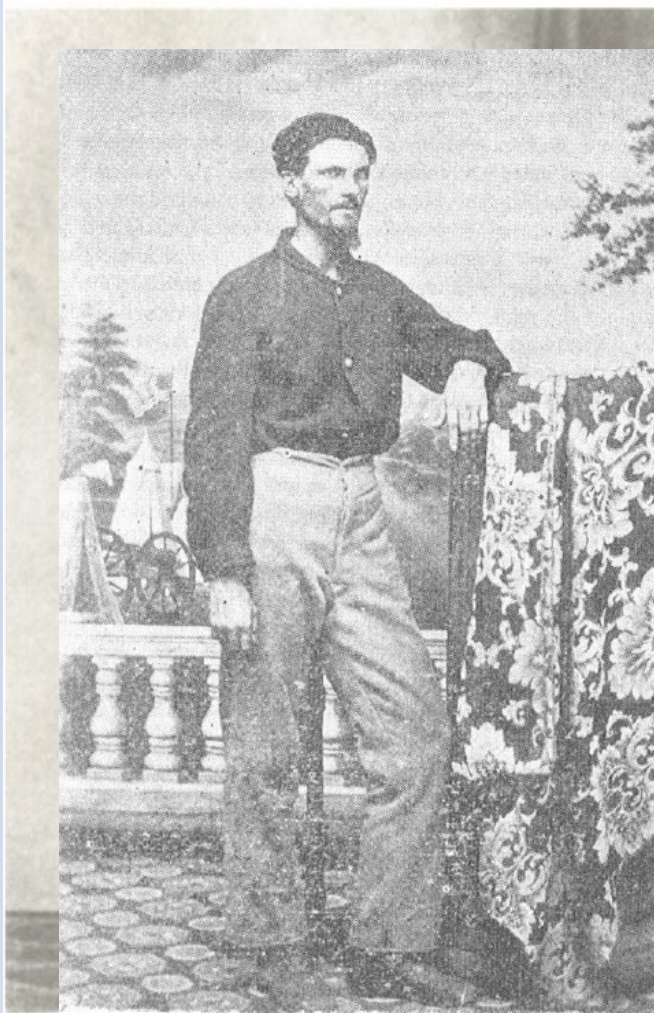

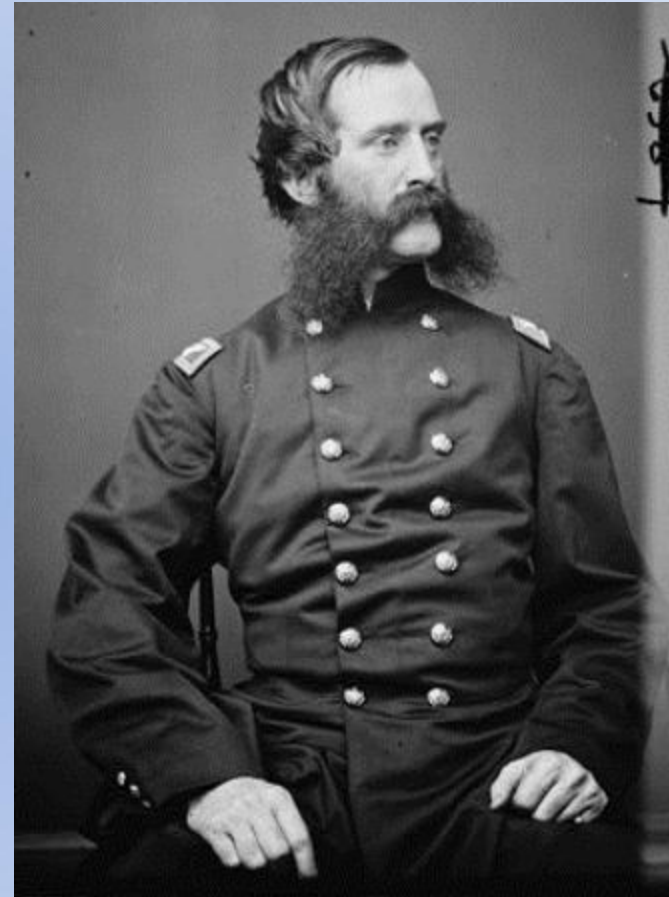
