AUTHOR AND HISTORIAN WILLIAM CONNERY SPEAKS ON "MOSBY'S RAIDS IN CIVIL WAR NORTHERN VIRGINIA" AT JUNE 11th MEETING

John Singleton Mosby, also known by his nickname, the "Gray Ghost," was a feared Confederate army cavalry battalion commander. His command, the 43rd Battalion, 1st Virginia Cavalry (known as "Mosby's Rangers"), was a partisan ranger unit noted for its lightning quick raids and its ability to elude Federal pursuers, blending in with local farmers and townsmen. The area of north central Virginia in which Mosby operated with impunity was known during the war, and ever since, as "Mosby's Confederacy." Our June speaker will bring us tales of these raids from his new book: *Mosby's Raids in Civil War Northern Virginia*.

William Connery grew up in Baltimore, Maryland, which was considered "neutral territory" in the War Between the States. He has a degree in history from the University of Maryland at College Park. Mr. Connery has been contributing to the *Civil War Courier*, the *Washington Times* Civil War page and other publications.

In 2012, he was awarded the prestigious Jefferson Davis Historical Gold Medal for his previous History Press book, *Civil War Northern Virginia 1861*. Mr. Connery is a member of the Company of Military Historians, the Capitol Hill Civil War Round Table, and the E.A. Poe Society of Baltimore. He is a frequently requested speaker on the Civil War and other American history topics in the Washington, D.C., metro region.

CIVIL WAR TRAVELS WITH MS. REBELLE

Union Gen. Johann August **Ernst von Willich**

Never did Ms. Rebelle think she would be writing about a Communist who was a Civil War general in the Union Army, but she has done just that. I found General Johann Au-




aust Ernst von Willich's grave in Elm Wood Cemetery in St. Mary's, Ohio last year. He's buried in Section F, Lot St. Mary's is lo-42. cated on Route 33 going northwest out of Columbus, and is nearly at the Indiana state line. He dropped some of his names along the way through the war, and was mostly known as August Willich.

August (I'm sure it must be pronounced Auuu-guust) was born Braunsburg, East Prussia, on November 19, 1810. Like some

other of our featured generals, he was orphaned at of the age three. His father was captain of the hussars during the Napoleonic Wars. August and his older brother were sent to Ameri-

ca to live with Friedrich Schleiermacher, a theologian. Schleiermacher's wife was a distant relative of Willich. At the age of 12, he entered the Potsdam Academy as a cadet. He graduated in 1828 as a seclieutenant ond and later served as captain of the 7th Royal Artillery Brigade. In 1846, he resigned from the army. His letter of resignation was not accepted, and he was arrested and

court-martialed. After he was acquitted and allowed to resign, he became a commander during the German Revolution of 1848.

He and Karl Schapper became the leaders of the left faction of the Communist League. Two of his friends at that time also became Civil War generals: Franz Sigel and Carl Schurz. He left Prussia at that time, immigrating to Switzerland and then England; learned a trade as a carpenter; and, along with Schapper, became the leader of an anti-Karl Marx group. Willich and French Revolutionary Emmanuel Barthelemy plotted to kill Karl Marx because they felt he was too conservative. Willich first publicly insulted Marx and then challenged him to a duel, but Marx refused to fight. Marx let his associate Conrad Schramm duel with Willich. Barthelemy acting as Willich's second. Schramm was shot, but survived.

In 1853, August came to the United States and worked at the Brooklyn Navy Yard. He later worked for the coastal survey. 1858, he moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, and became the editor of the German Republican (Der Cincinnati Republikaner), which was printed in German for the many German immigrants living in Ohio.

In 1861, at the start of the Civil War, Willich recruited German immigrants to form the 9th Ohio Infantry ("Die Neuner"). Most of

them came from the Cincinnati area called "Over the Rhine." His recruiting efforts enabled the Union Army to enlist 1,500 German immigrants. The 9th served in western Virginia and saw action at Rich Mountain and Carnifex Ferry. Later that year, Indiana Governor Oliver P. Morton, a supporter of Abra-

ham Lincoln, commissioned Willich as the colonel of the 32nd Indiana, also called the "First German." Willich's men were drilled in German. His men called him Papa, because of his care and concern for them. When time permitted, he had brick ovens constructed for his men so they would have access to fresh bread.

The 32nd Indiana fought at Rowlett's Station, Shiloh (on the 2nd day), Perryville, and Stones River, where he was captured when his horse was shot out

from under him. He was sent to Libby Prison in Richmond. After four months, he was released and exchanged for Confederates in May 1863. In Willich's own words about his march through Southern states as a prisoner - being insulted and taunted - he said: "the only ones who accepted us, cooked for us, or did us favors at every opportunity were the slaves;" he added "that the Union Army were their liberators." After release from Libby Prison, he stopped in Cincinnati prior to rejoining his


troops and addressed 3,000 German immigrants at the city's German center, Turner Hall.

Willich was known for his leadership ability. He was fond of playing *La Marseillaise* during battles. At the battle of Shiloh, when his men became unsteady, he stood in front of them with his back to enemy and took his men through the manual of arms. The men then launched a bayonet attack.

Willich was promoted to brigadier general in July 1862, and fought under General Don Carlos Buell at the battle of Perryville. In the XX Corps, he fought in the Tullahoma Campaign, Chattanooga Campaign, and his 32nd Indiana captured Orchard Knob. He said to his men: "My poys, you kills me mit joy, you kills me mit joy." The 32nd was the first

to reach the top of Missionary Ridge.

The 32nd was under General Sherman in the Atlanta Campaign. Sherman had a policy that no alcoholic beverages would be allowed on the campaign. General Willich spoke to General Sherman and told him that if the 32nd was not allowed to have their beer ration, it would seriously deteriorate their mo-Sherman acquiesced, and granted his request to continue his men's beer rations.

Willich was wounded in the shoulder at Resaca and sent back to Cincinnati, where he was promoted to brevet major general. He had various administrative duties in Cincinnati and Covington, and then Newport, Kentucky. On October 21, 1865, he resigned from the army to return to civilian life. He lived in Cincinnati at 1419 Main Street, where the house still stands (I have yet to locate a picture of it. He became audi-

tor of Hamilton County, Ohio.

He returned to Germany in 1870 and volunteered his services to the Prussian Army during the Franco-Prussian War. Being 60 years old in 1870, the Prussian Army declined to take him. Willich then decided to go to college at the University of Berlin and earned a degree in philosophy.

Willich returned to the United States to live in St. Mary's, Ohio, where an old comrade,

Major Charles Hipp, had suggested he live. No longer a Communist, he turned to literature to fill his remaining year, and organized a Shakespeare Club in St. Mary's. Papa Willich died on January 22, 1878 at age 67.

NOTE: Ms. Rebelle's hobby is traveling the country finding and honoring the graves of our 1,008 Civil War generals. So far she has located and photographed 403....169 Confederate and 234 Union.
